2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

After his baptism in the Jordan, Jesus set out on his great mission. Throughout this year, we follow the course of his mission in readings from the gospel of Mark. The gospel readings of this Sunday (from John) and next Sunday (from Mark) invite us to set out on this journey of discovery as disciples of the Lord. Just as he called the first disciples, the Saviour has a personal call for each one of us to become his 'disciple'. The recovery of the long neglected theme of 'discipleship' is one of the signs of new vitality on today's Church. The word, 'disciple', occurs many times in the New Testament. Why was it so important for the first Christians? Discipleship, the privileged relationship one can have with a great and inspiring leader, has been an important factor in the shaping of human history. The leader's vision and commitment call forth admiration and confidence – the lives of their followers are changed, and they face life with a new inspiration and hope. Clearly, those who made up the communities of the New Testament experienced this kind of relationship with the Risen Lord. Today's reading from John's gospel helps us to understand how we too can have this kind of relationship with the Saviour.

Many factors are at work, as disciples come to meet and appreciate their leader. Those who met the Saviour in today's reading, we are told, have been 'disciples' of John the Baptist. It is his selfless witness that leads them to 'follow' Jesus. In the gospel story, of course, the Baptist represents the faith and expectations of the Old Testament. Knowledge of the great themes of the old Israel's hopes is fundamental if we are to understand the message and vision of the Saviour. Closer to home, it is

often unselfish expressions of faith, hope and love on the part of other members of a vital Christian community that are important in our coming to know the Saviour.

It is important that we seek that incomparable intimacy with the Saviour that is our birthright through baptism – not relating to him as a remote figure, but confidently sharing our lives, in all their complex tangles, with him.

Today's story of the two disciples encourages this trust and confidence. Encouraged by the Baptist, they approached Jesus; he gave them a warm welcome – 'Come and see'; and they spent the rest of the day with him.

As disciples of inspiring leaders, many men and women have had the experience of finding themselves, and giving a meaning to their lives. We can look forward to that same experience, if we accept the Lord's invitation to share our lives with him. Today's reading reminds us that Peter found his true self in the new name Jesus gave him. The Scriptures reflect the fact that for many cultures a personal name points to the mysterious identity of each person. For the wisdom of Christian faith, this personal identity has its origin in the eternal designs of God. Samuel was called by name. Simon's unique place in the plan of God was declared in the new name Jesus gave him. He still had much to learn, but the path that was to lead to his eternal glory had been made clear.

From Today's Reading

First Reading: 1 Samuel 3:3b-10, 19. Samuel was dedicated to service of the Lord in the Temple at the beginning of his life by his mother, Hannah, in thanksgiving for the miracle that allowed her, a barren woman, to have a child. Samuel, therefore, grew up in the Temple under the care of Eli, the High Priest. Today we hear about an encounter the young Samuel had with the Lord. This encounter illustrates God's calling upon Samuel to serve Him. Although Samuel was at first confused, along with Eli, when he came to realize it was the Lord calling him, he submitted himself to whatever God would have him do. In essence, Samuel was faithful to following God's calling upon His life. If we read on in the biblical narrative, we see that Samuel became one of the greatest prophets in Israel. It was, in fact, Samuel who advised King Saul, the first king of Israel, and then anointed the shepherd David as the next king. Thus, he played a very important role in salvation history as a result of his obedience to the will of God. Each of us also have a calling from God. We call that our vocation. God knows what is best for each of us and wants to do great things through us. But will we listen and follow? Will we say to Him when He calls us, "Speak, for your servant is listening"?

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 6:13c-15a,17-20. The call by the Apostle Paul in this passage to "avoid immorality" is another call to obey the Lord. God created us and knows what is best for us. Obeying Him, therefore, is what is best for us. We are called, in particular, here to "glorify God in your body." As Christians, our bodies are "a temple of the Holy Spirit." We should not defile that temple by committing acts with our bodies that are contrary to God's will. Since our "bodies are members of Christ," those immoral acts bring, in a sense, defilement to Christ. As followers of Christ we are called to act in a way that brings honor and glory to Christ, as His representatives. Immorality has the opposite effect—giving a bad name to Christ. Furthermore, Paul reminds us here that we belong completely to God. This is not merely because He created us, but because He has also redeemed us. "For you have been purchased at a price." What was the price? The shedding of Jesus' blood on the cross. Jesus died so we could live. Thus, we belong to Him and should act accordingly, honoring Him with our bodies. Paul, moreover, reminds us that the future destiny of our bodies is resurrection. God raised Jesus from the dead and will raise us up too at the end of time.

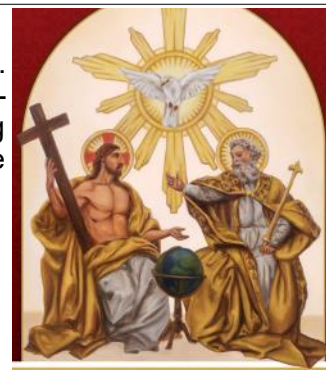

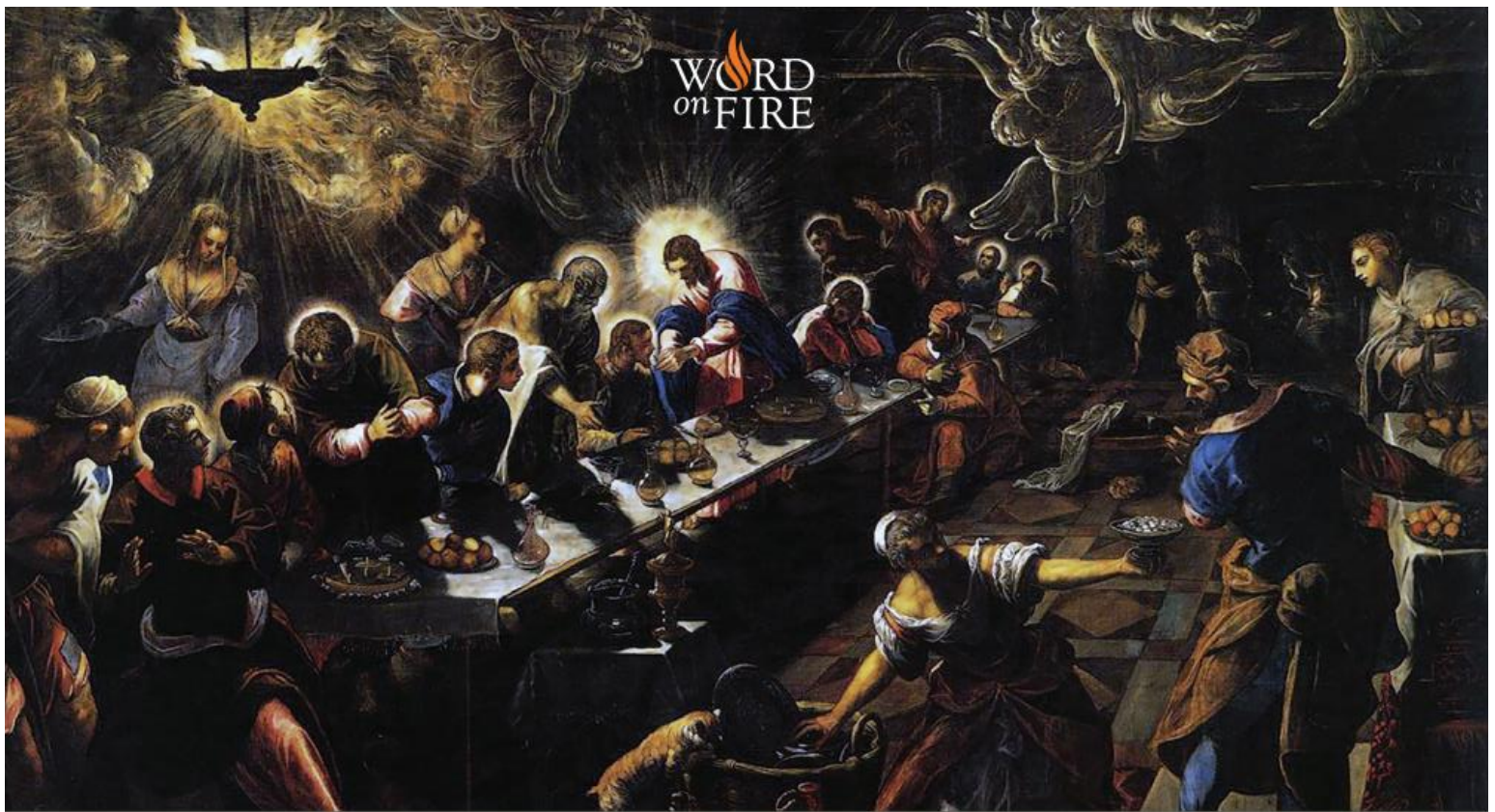

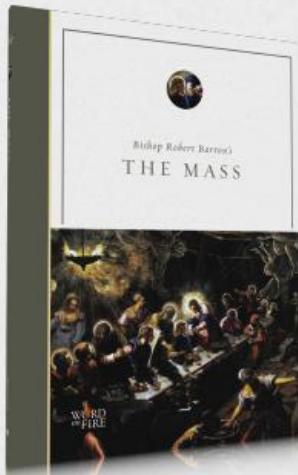

Have you ever wondered what to do with that old pair of prescription eyeglasses? Here's the perfect solution!

**Bring eyeglass donations to Holy Family Parish
and place them in the clear box in the hall entrance.**

Your donations will be sent to the Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre (CLERC) in Calgary, Alberta where Lions volunteer their time and services to prepare eyeglasses for distribution, cleaning and classifying each pair by prescription.

Once the CLERC has prepared the glasses they are given to qualified missions delivering glasses to the needy around the world.

According to The World Health Organization, 153 million people have uncorrected refractive errors (near-sightedness, far-sightedness or astigmatism). Most of these vision impairments are quickly diagnosed and easy to treat with corrective lenses.

Still, millions of people in developing nations are pushed deeper into poverty simply because they don't have corrective eyeglasses. They can't learn, because reading is difficult. They can't work to the best of their ability, because they can't see clearly.

For children, clear vision means a better education, healthier development and a better quality of life. For adults, it means greater employment opportunity and economic strength. For seniors it means less dependence on others.



What types of eyeglasses are collected?

New and used reading, single vision, bifocal, children, safety, swim goggles with prescription lenses and both prescription and non-prescription sunglasses (clip-ons and glasses). Glasses may consist of glasses in frames, frames only, or uncut lenses.

Cases are NOT needed.

Broken glasses and loose lenses are also accepted. Lions have partners who will recover metals and other components from broken glasses.
